## INTRODUCTION

This exhibition of eighteenth-century Italian drawings is the most extensive in the series intended to show all the drawings in the Robert Lehman Collection. Robert Lehman was especially interested in the works of the Venetian artists. He began collecting Venetian drawings in the 1920s and continued it steadily through forty years. Thus, his acquisition of the Paul Wallraf collection in the 1960s only rounded out a splendid assembly.

The drawings of the Guardis, Canaletto, and the two Tiepolos constitute the main body of the exhibition. These artists' development and techniques can be studied almost fully from the sheets seen here. The subjects include landscapes and *vedute*, religious and everyday scenes, and caricatures. The famous series of the Tiepolos, such as the lives of Christ and of the Virgin, the story of St. Anthony, and the designs for the frescoes in the family villa in Zianigo, are all represented here with outstanding examples. Nine drawings from Giovanni Domenico's famous Punchinello series, *Divertimento per li regazzi*, also are included, as are some other sheets that are related to this light-hearted but very touching satire of Venetian life at the end of the eighteenth century.

The virtuoso techniques, brilliant observations, and complete command of the medium are also evident in many drawings that are not related to any known works of these artists, but were evidently done simply for the sake and pleasure of drawing. These sheets, too, are rich sources for the study of contemporary life, manners, and work.

Canaletto's *Meeting at "Liston"* summarizes the social changes in progress at the turn of the century. Novelli's design for the sign of a mirror maker throws an interesting light on the glass industry of Venice. The drawings of Carlevaris or Zucchi represent the various social classes, their aspirations and everyday lives.

Most of these drawings are widely known and have been exhibited and published extensively; therefore, the present catalogue entries and bibliography are brief. Further information may be found in the works listed at the end of the catalogue.

The exhibition is accompanied by many eighteenth-century Venetian frames and other contemporary decorative objects, all from the Robert Lehman Collection.

The staff of the Robert Lehman Collection assisted in the preparation of the exhibition and catalogue. The graphic design for the exhibition—especially that for the catalogue and poster—was the work of the Design Department.

**The drawing is not signed or dated, but the style and the costume of the young woman both indicate that it is from the 1740s. Since one of the artist's daughters was an accomplished portrait painter in chalk and pastel, the drawing may be attributable to her.**

Morassi dates this drawing to the last years of the eighteenth century and points out its affinities to the Venetian art of that time.



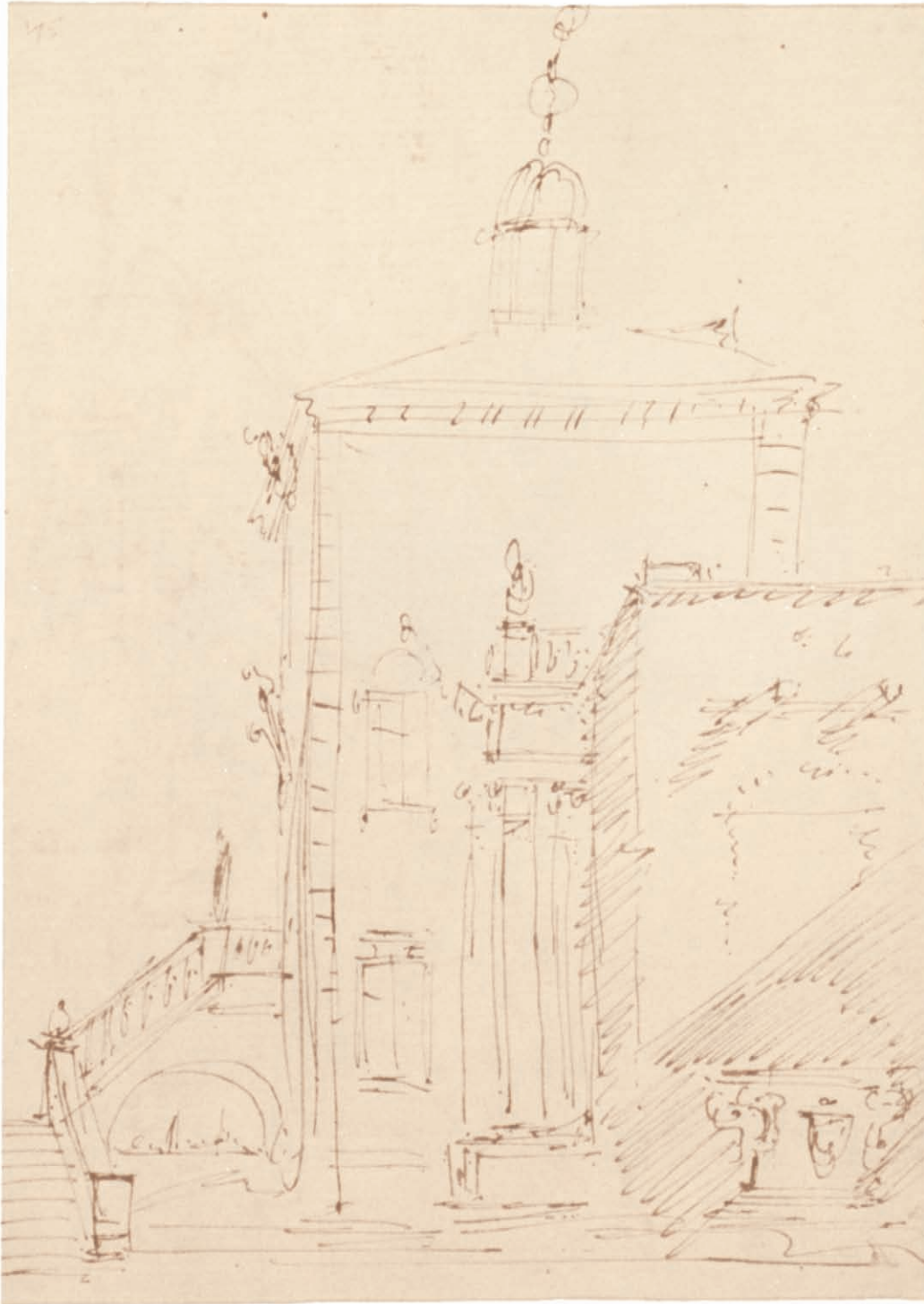
CARLO ANTONIO BUFFAGNOTTI, Bologna, Ferrara, Genoa, b. ca. 1660; still active 1710

4. *Siege of a Fortification*

Pen and ink on paper, 23.2 x 19.4 cm. Inscribed on the old mat at lower center: *veduta con zocca Assediata. Disegna Carlo Buffagnotti.*

Unpublished.

This prolific painter and engraver, a collaborator of Ferdinando Galli Bibiena in Torino, was also a designer of stage sets and theatrical scenery. The fantastic costumes of the figures and the unusual proportions of this drawing may be indications that it is one of his stage designs—possibly a preliminary drawing for an engraved work.

This drawing, after nature or possibly from memory, is of existing buildings, although their original identities are not known. Morassi points out that it is in the manner of the *veduta ideata* and that some elements of it can be found in certain paintings by the artist.

This quick, nervous sketch was rendered from nature and probably on the site without a preliminary pencil drawing. It is closely related to a drawing of the same subject in the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford (K. T. Parker, *Disegni Veneti di Oxford*, exhibition catalogue, San Giorgio Maggiore, Venice, 1956, no. 82).

It has been suggested that "this particularly brilliant drawn veduta" is from Canaletto's early stay in England, probably from 1749 (Bean-Stampfle, no. 157). It is generally accepted that the drawing is also the basis for the artist's famous painting of the same subject (see W. G. Constable, *Canaletto*, no. 446).

Similar views of Padua by the artist are in the collections of Windsor Castle and the Albertina, Vienna (See W. G. Constable, *Canaletto*, Oxford, 1962, nos. 675, 676). This drawing may be one of several versions mentioned by Constable as formerly in the Mariette and F. F. Madan collections.

This rapid study is in the so-called *maniera cifrata* that the artist used in his later years. He frequently drew the interior of San Marco and on a similar sketch, now at the Kunsthalle in Hamburg, he proudly noted: “de Anni 68 senza Ochiali L’anno 1766” (Morassi, p. 12). This and other drawings of the same style and provenance might have been pages in one of Canaletto’s sketchbooks (M. Muraro, *Venetian Drawings from the Collection of Janos Scholz*, Venice, 1957, no. 79).

In this important and beautiful sheet from the later years of Canaletto's life, the lively and colorful scene on the Piazza is masterfully depicted with rapid strokes and a deft use of washes. The animated drawing, with its rhythmic grouping of people, dogs, and buildings, exudes the essence of the famous center of Venice. Another version of this composition is in Windsor Castle, but it is probably a workshop drawing (Morassi, p. 81).

Representations of figures in domestic interiors are rare in the oeuvre of Canaletto. Therefore, the attribution of this drawing to him is still uncertain. Morassi remarks that a somewhat similar drawing by Canaletto is in the Sir Robert Witt Bequest at the Courtauld Institute in London and is dated around 1755 (Morassi, p. 13).

Support for the attribution to Canaletto is mixed. However, the drawing is definitely from Canaletto's circle.

This and the following twelve drawings are all related to Canaletto's oeuvre, but they are not from his hand. These views lack the human figures that so enliven Canaletto's similar *vedute* and are drawn in a somewhat dry and mechanical manner. Most of the sheets are dependent upon Canaletto's series of engravings published in 1742 under the title *Urbis Venetiarum Prospectus*. The artists suggested as authors for these drawings include Canaletto's nephew Bernardo Belotto and Visentini, another member of Canaletto's school (Morassi, p. 14).

Pignatti remarks that “drawings by Carlevaris are very rare in American collections.” This drawing, probably the portrait of a senator, is even more unique, since it represents a full-length figure. It is generally dated to around 1730.

Very little is known of this artist, the son of the painter Gaspare Diziani (1689–1767). He was probably a student of his father and Antonio Guardi, and most of his works reflect their influence. This drawing is a study for an altarpiece very reminiscent of one by Guardi in the Church of Belvedere in Aquileja (see Morassi, no. 19).

This sheet is from an album that was broken up probably before 1924. Other pages, all showing the same vertical lines, are in various public and private collections (see J. Bean, *Italian Drawings in the Art Museum of Princeton University*, Princeton, 1966, nos. 98, 99). A sheet in the Metropolitan Museum, depicting two standing male figures and a seated woman, bears the number 41, thus, the album must have had many pages (Bean-Stampfle, no. 181). The attribution of the drawings from this album to Fontebasso is not accepted by several scholars and connoisseurs (see J. Scholz, "Italian Drawings in the Art Museum of Princeton University," *Burlington Magazine* 109 [1967], p. 296).

This prolific Bolognese artist produced a large body of drawings and graphic works, among them anatomical and compositional studies and studies of the human head. This sheet is one of the latter, which, during Gandolfi's lifetime, were reproduced in engravings by Tadolini and by the artist himself.

*Macchiette* are small representations of human figures formed from various tones of wash. Here noblemen, women, and children are shown under the arcades of a public building or a large house. They may be onlookers at a ceremonial procession such as the crowning of Doge Alvise Mocenigo, which took place in 1763. Other Venetian artists depicted this occasion; it is quite possible that Guardi made this and other sketches at the time.

Anno 1787. Viniliato a sua Eccell: Missr. LODOVICO Co: MANIN K. e. Proccr: di S. Marco ora SERENISSIMO DOGE felicemente REGNANTE*. Flanking this inscription is a list of buildings with numbers corresponding to those in the drawing. Inscribed in lower right corner: *F. G. Pinxit*; inscribed in lower left corner: *P. B. A. A. C. Inv. Teat.*

This late drawing was acclaimed by Fiocco as "rich with a magisterial vitality and freshness... one of the most significant by the sensitive painter" (Fiocco, "Francesco Guardi pittore di teatro," p. 364). Its abundant details, the elaborate inscriptions, and the list of buildings are all indications that it was intended for an etching or engraving. It may be related to the building of a proposed new theater, marked here with the number 10. It is known from other drawings and documents that Guardi was involved in the planning of this building, which was never erected.

This is an architectural *capriccio* in the fine manner for which Guardi is greatly appreciated. The light, free lines, the varied washes, and the similarity to other drawings by the artist indicate a late date, between 1780 and 1790 (see J. Byam Shaw, *The Drawings of Francesco Guardi*, London, 1951, pl. 62).

A preparatory drawing for a painting representing the Regatta on the Giudecca Canal reappeared only recently and was acquired by the Alte Pinakothek in Munich (R. Kultzen, "Ein Spätwerk von Francesco Guardi," p. 219). The painting and several drawn studies for it, including this one, are dated between 1784 and 1789. Byam Shaw remarks that the present sheet "is among the most beautiful and ambitious drawings in Guardi's developed style" (Byam Shaw, *The Drawings of Francesco Guardi*, p. 27). Especially ambitious and extraordinary is the panoramic view, which is "certainly wider than the eye could include in a single focus" (Byam Shaw, *The Drawings of Francesco Guardi*, p. 64). Therefore, it must have been composed from three separate drawings and several different views, probably taken from a boat positioned in front of San Giorgio.

This drawing and the following twenty-one others by Giacomo Guardi, son and successor of Francesco, belonged to an album that originally contained thirty-six similar views of Venice and its environs. The album was put together between 1800 and 1804 and was in a private collection in Ireland before 1828. In contrast to his father's work, Giacomo's drawings are lifeless, but they constitute an interesting pictorial record of Venice before the period of mid-nineteenth-century industrialization and large-scale destruction of historic buildings.

Morassi remarks that this study is in the manner of the eighteenth-century English conversation pieces. The father, possibly a Venetian senator, explains to his two sons the beauty and goodness of the classical heritage, personified by the statue of Minerva and the round tem-pietto in the background. At the left, the mother listens to her eldest daughter reading. It is not known whether Novelli used this study for a painting. From the style of the costume it may be dated to the 1780s.

This study is a rare document of Venetian art and industry and of the cooperation between the artists and artisans of the city. The design was probably transferred onto a large sign made of wood or metal. The firm of Antonio Codognato and Son produced the mirrors and other works made of crystal for which the city had been justly famous since the Middle Ages.

It is not clear, however, whether the house is the artist’s birthplace or rather one he owned in 1726.

It has been remarked that “in this important early drawing Giambattista’s contour line has an almost brutal incisiveness” (Bean-Stampfle, p. 41).

Tiepolo himself and given by him to his son for the Library of the Somasco (sic) Convent S. Maria della Salute at Venice in which he was professed. At the suppression of the Convents the volumes fell into the hands of Cicognara by whom they were given in an exchange to Canova from whom they passed after his death to Mons. Canova his brother, by him they were sold to Sig.<sup>r</sup> Francesco Pesaro and by him to me. E. C. Venice 1842" (The Savile Gallery, *Catalogue of Drawings*, London, 1928).

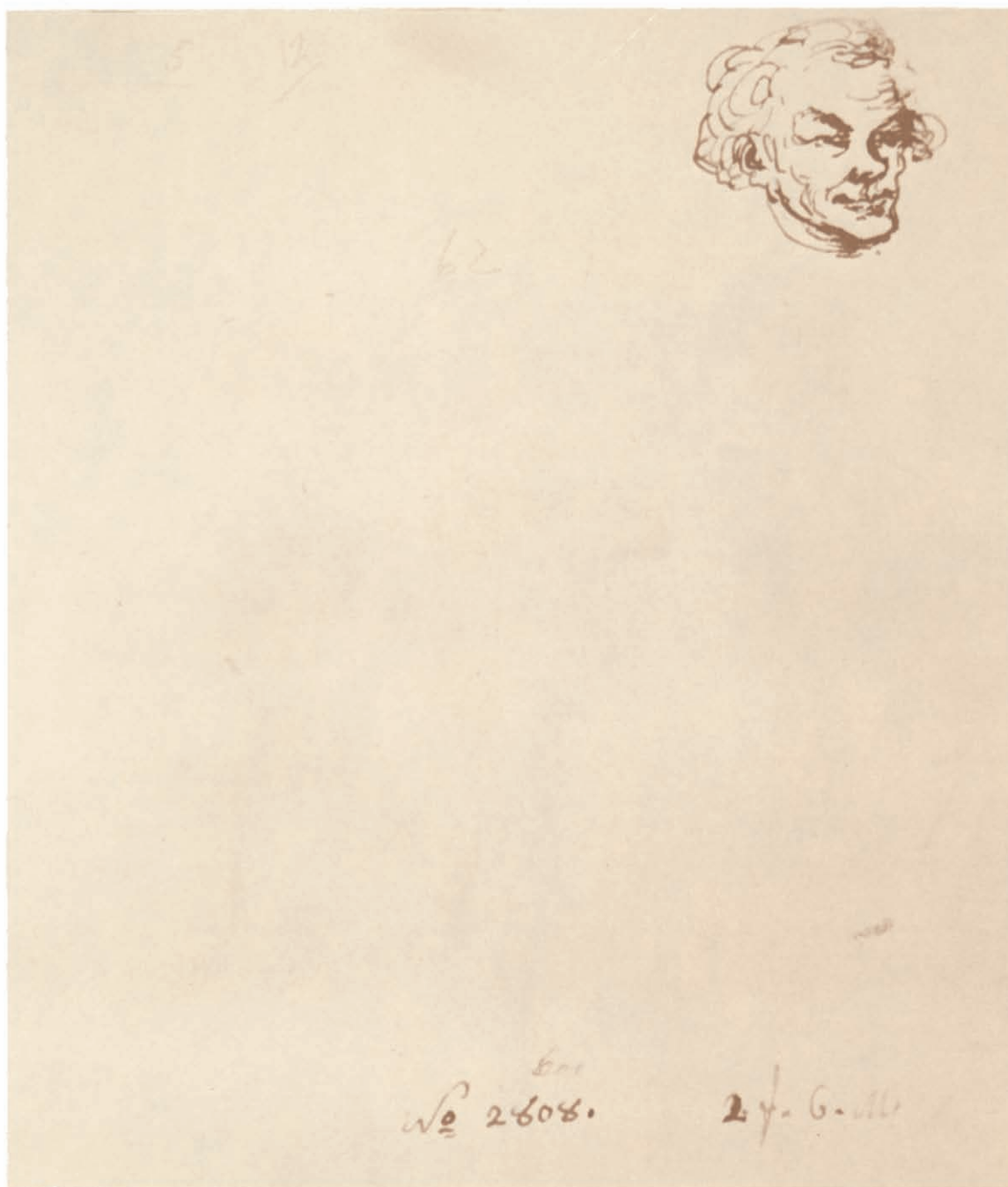

The figure is in the scene called “Angelica Helps Medoro” in the so-called Gerusalemme Liberata Room of the villa, which received its name from Torquato Tasso’s famous work (R. Pallucchini, *Gli Affreschi di G. B. e D. Tiepolo alla Villa Valmarana di Vicenza*, Bergamo, 1945, pl. 30).

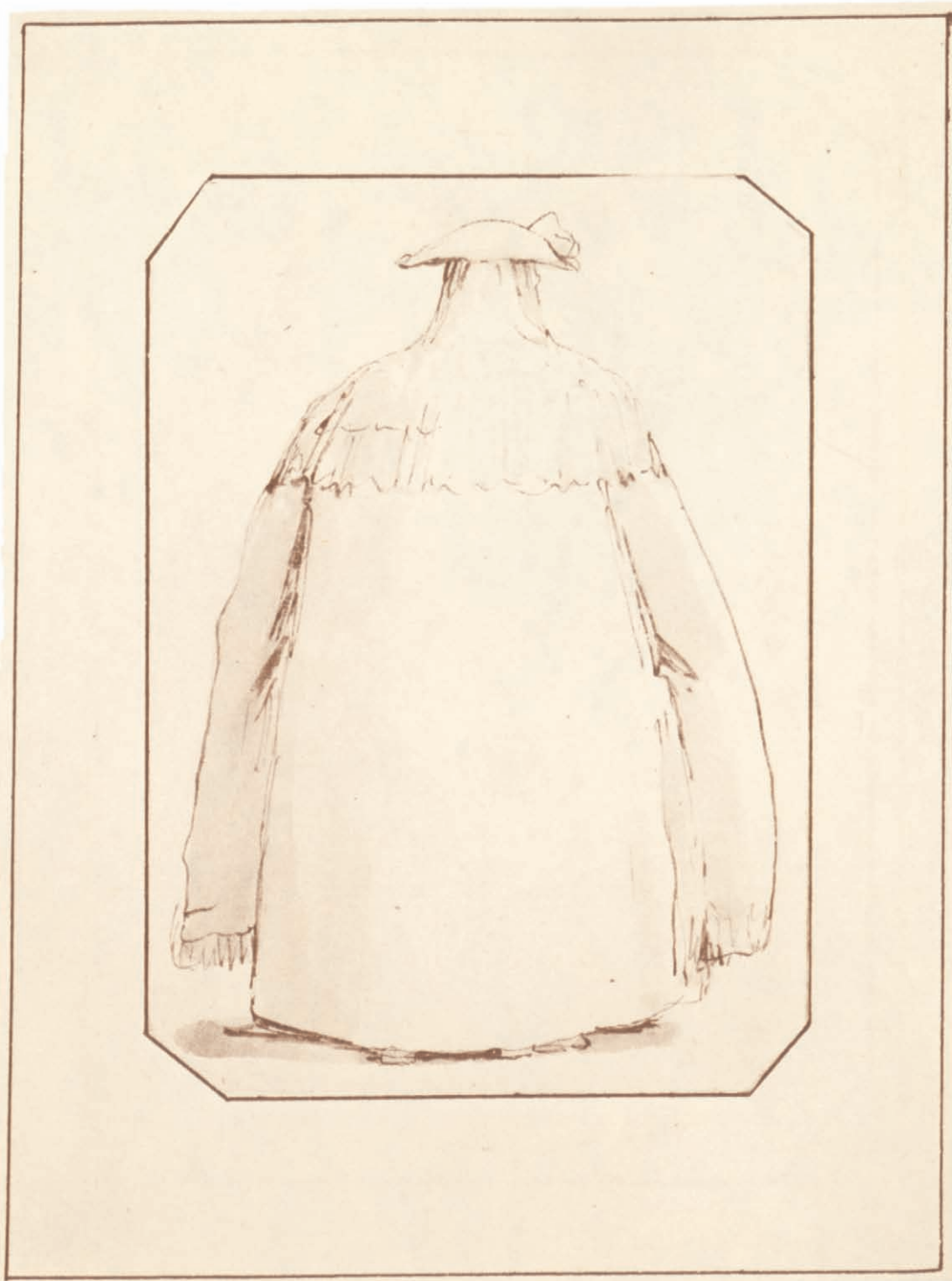

This is one of the first in Giandomenico's series of 103 drawings titled *Divertimento per li regazzi* ("Entertainment for Children"). Despite the title, the series was intended for adults—the people of Venice, affectionately called *regazzi* by the aging artist. Through Punchinello, the leading character of the *commedia dell'arte*, Tiepolo satirized and poked fun at Venetian life and society. The full range of the *commedia umana* evolves in the 103 episodes—some mildly satirical, others cruel. The subject was not new to the artist. His father, Giambattista, had made sketches of groups of Punchinelli (see No. 75). In 1793, Giandomenico himself had painted frescoes of Punchinelli for the Camera dei Pagliacci of the family villa in Zianigo. Like this scene, the other drawings in this series are full of warmth, humor, and shrewd observation. They are drawn in a light yet assured style with a superior use of washes. The album was dispersed through auction, but, fortunately, nine of the drawings are now gathered in the Robert Lehman Collection. Domenico also might be mocking the planting of the ‘Tree of Liberty,’ that symbol of French ‘liberation’ which in the late 1790’s had been raised in the *piazze* of conquered Veneto cities.” The latter interpretation is strengthened by the presence of a cast-off military drum; the faggot might be the *fasces*, a Roman symbol adopted during the French Revolution.

This brilliant depiction of Venetian life and society at the end of the eighteenth century is also a testament to Giandomenico’s surpassing talent. At the same time it is a shrewd observation of the process of history, for these two groups of people who have met while strolling on the piazza near the Café Florian stand for the old society confronting the new order. The former is represented on the left by a nobleman in old-fashioned costume with a wig and tricorn. The representative of the new order is the young gentleman in striped hose, a short jacket, and a hairstyle “à la mode Directoire.” The golden tonality of the sheet and the indulgent attitude of the artist lend an unusual charm and warmth to this drawing.

The students waiting on the right are defined only by a few light strokes of wash on the white paper.

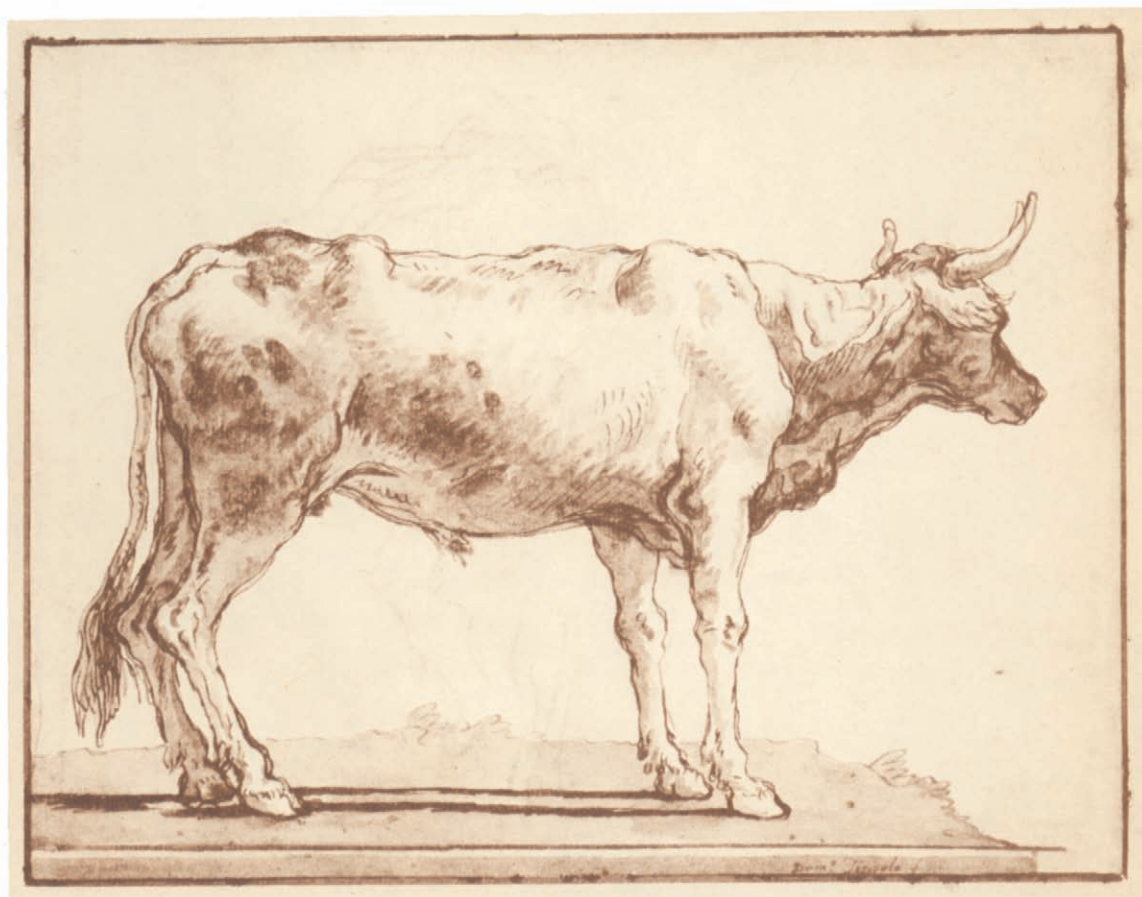

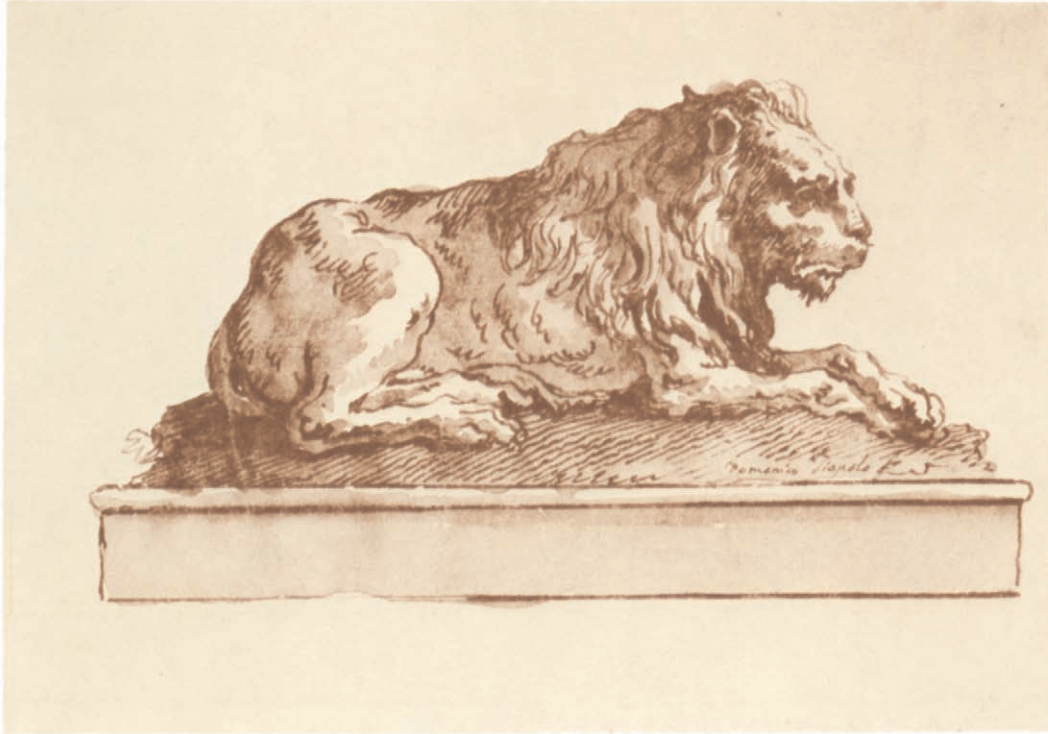
